

Celebrating life-changing milestones: Arianna's story



Three year old Arianna has Sotos Syndrome, a rare genetic disorder characterised by distinctive facial features, overgrowth in childhood, and learning and physical developmental delays.

Having spent the first seven weeks of her life in a neonatal intensive care unit receiving specialist paediatric care, Arianna was then in and out of hospital over the next 12 months due to recurring respiratory illnesses. Shortly before she turned one she required emergency life-saving surgery to relieve excess fluid around her heart. Arianna's development was delayed, she had very low muscle tone, and she was unable to feed normally. It was a confusing and frightening time for Arianna's mum Heather and her family.

Adjusting to this unexpected and challenging new life as the full-time, round-the-clock carer of a child with significant special needs began to take its toll on Heather's mental health. However, any respite from

her role of carer, even for one day a week, seemed unlikely. Then Heather heard about The Infants' Home.

After learning that we had the staff, facilities and expertise to provide care and education for children with additional needs in our mainstream child care centres, Heather enrolled Arianna in our Murray House centre for one day a week. Our integrated team of educators and allied health staff (including speech therapists, occupational therapists, social workers and a child and family health nurse), worked with Arianna, her parents and her external therapists to develop a family support plan

says that Arianna loves the meals that are provided at The Infants' Home, and definitely eats her fair share. Although non-verbal until she was two, Arianna's language is now in the low-normal range for her age.

Arianna now attends our Robinson House preschool centre three days per week. An exciting milestone for Arianna and her family was a recent invitation for Arianna to attend her first play date with a child in her centre. "That's massive for us, because when you have a child with additional needs, one of your fears is whether your child will ever have friends", says Heather.

to meet Arianna's health and development needs.

Staff learned how to tube feed Arianna as she was unable to eat solid food, and how to put on and remove the brace she has to wear for 16 to 20 hours each day to manage her scoliosis. Arianna was unable to sit unsupported due to very low muscle tone, so a customised chair was made for her so that she could participate in activities with the other children.

Arianna began to achieve some significant milestones. She became independently mobile, and can now keep up with the other children physically, although she becomes fatigued quickly due to her condition. She can eat solid food, and Heather

For Heather, having a place for Arianna at The Infants' Home not only ensures that her daughter can play, learn and make friends just like any other child. It also means that Heather can step out of her role of carer for a little while each week, creating better balance in her life, and giving her the respite she needs be a resilient mum, carer and advocate for her child.

HNF helps create our first kitchen garden

In October we welcomed a team of volunteers from our long-term supporter, the Herbalife Nutrition Foundation (HNF), who assembled some fabulous new raised garden beds, called 'Vegepods' for us, and helped the children plant herb and vegetable seedlings. This project was funded through a HNF Champion Fund grant to enable us to set up a working kitchen garden onsite.

The children, educators and kitchen staff worked together to plan which vegetables and herbs would be best suited for use in the kitchen to prepare children's daily meals, and for children to use in their own cooking projects. Groups of children visit the kitchen garden throughout the week to observe the plants' progress, care for them and to harvest the produce.

The plants are growing well, and are already beginning to produce a healthy crop of zucchinis (see inset above), cucumbers and capsicums, as well as lots of fresh herbs.

HMAS Sydney II Wreath Laying Ceremony

The Infants' Home is proud of our long relationship with HMAS Sydney, having been their adopted charity for over 50 years, since 1965. The commissioning of NUSHIP Sydney in 2020 will see us celebrate our continuing partnership with HMAS Sydney.

On 19 November we were honoured to attend a Wreath Laying and Memorial Ceremony in Sydney's Martin Place to commemorate the 78th anniversary of the sinking of the HMAS Sydney II on 19 November 1941, and the loss of its 645 officers and crew. The Infants' Home's President, Mary Verschuer (pictured right), laid a wreath in honour of their memory.





'Mindfulness' workshop presentation at the 2019 Early Childhood Australia conference

In September, Johnson House centre Director Amy Jones and occupational therapist Justine Tarrant presented the workshop 'All mixed up! Supporting children to unpack feelings and emotions through mindfulness', at the Early Childhood Australia Conference in Hobart. Justine (pictured above with a group of children engaging in mindfulness exercises on an excursion to Auburn Botanic Gardens) and Amy highlighted the work they have been doing in Johnson House preschool to help children practice mindfulness in their everyday play and relationships. The presentation included many practical ideas that participants could take away to help embed this program into their own centres, and Amy and Justine received some great feedback from other child and family service practitioners.

Gorton House children make new friends at Bupa aged care

Recently there has been a growing interest in how intergenerational contact between children and older people may positively impact both children and adults. This was highlighted in the recent ABC TV series 'Old People's Home for Four Year Olds', which aired in August, and followed what happened when a group of preschoolers



began visiting retirement home residents for weekly interactive activities. Since April this year the children from our own Gorton House preschool room have been going on fortnightly visits to residents at the Bupa Aged Care Ashfield. This experience has given all participants, both young and old, opportunities to make new friends and learn from one another, as well as giving the older adults a sense of purpose and helping the children to understand and value older people.

Family corner

Chef Charoen, from Wests Ashfield Leagues Club, works in our onsite kitchen to prepare children's daily meals through our food service partnership with Wests. This recipe is a favourite with the children.

Herbed Chicken Drumettes (serves 4)

Ingredients

1 kilogram chicken drumettes 3 cloves garlic, crushed 100 grams crushed ginger ½ teaspoon paprika powder ½ teaspoon turmeric powder ½ teaspoon ground cumin ½ teaspoon salt ¼ bunch parsley, chopped ¼ bunch coriander, chopped

100 millilitres olive oil

100 millilitres water



Method

- 1. Clean chicken drumettes and trim any fat.
- 2. Combine all other ingredients in bowl using a stick blender, and blend until smooth (if you don't have stick blender, chop the fresh herbs finely with a knife and then mix together with the other ingredients).
- 3. Place chicken drumettes in marinade, cover and place in fridge to marinate for 2 hours, or overnight.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 180C.
- 5. Place drumettes on an oven tray lined with baking paper. Bake for 15 minutes, then turn drumettes over and cook for a further 10 minutes, or until cooked through.

Our history



Lady MacCallum was The Infants' Home's longest-serving president. For 41 years, from



1905 until 1946, Lady MacCallum stewarded The Infants' Home through two world wars and the great depression. She oversaw the building of many new buildings on the Ashfield site, and the expansion of the kindergarten. As well as donating her time to The Infants' Home, Lady MacCallum would also often donate money towards building projects, or Christmas gifts for the children.
