Company Overview

The Infants' Home Child and Family Services is a leading provider of high-quality early childhood education and care, allied health and early intervention services for children and families. For over 150 years the key focus of our work has been supporting families and children experiencing hardship or vulnerabilities to make a more positive future.

Purpose/Key Objectives

The Speech Pathologist provides early intervention services for children aged 0 to 9 years across all programs at The Infants' Home. As a member of the Allied Health team, the Speech Pathologist is based primarily in the Early Intervention and Wellbeing Hub and supports our Early Childhood Education and Care (ECEC) Centres as required.

This role delivers evidence-based assessments and interventions, both individual and group, that are aligned with children's and families' goals. Services are delivered onsite and in community settings, including homes, schools, early learning centres and parks. Goals are developed in collaboration with families, and outcomes are evaluated and reported to guide ongoing planning.

When working in the ECEC Centres, the Speech Pathologist focuses on building the skills, knowledge and confidence of parents and educators to support children's development. They work with the integrated team, families and external professionals to apply the Response to Intervention (RTI) Model and help educators embed it into everyday practice. The Speech Pathologist may also contribute to community programs, such as supported playgroups, where appropriate.

Responsibilities

1. Early Intervention and Wellbeing Hub and Community Programs

- Deliver evidence-based assessment and therapy for children aged 0 to 9 with functional and developmental needs.
- Provide services across settings (onsite, home, early childhood centres, schools) as appropriate and support playgroups parent capacity building or other community programs.
- Collaborate with families to set meaningful, functional goals through a family-centred approach.
- Empower caregivers with strategies to support communication development in daily routines.
- Facilitate and co-lead goal-based therapy groups.
- Act as a key worker for assigned families, coordinating care and supporting goal achievement across disciplines.

- Ensure therapy aligns with the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) or management plan goals and principles of reasonable and necessary supports.
- Prepare clear, professional documentation including support plans, progress notes, and reports.
- Use standardised and informal tools and outcome measures to track progress and adjust therapy accordingly.
- Participate in goal reviews and contribute to NDIS plan development with families and support teams.
- Maintain professional registration and adhere to ethical and legal standards.
- Engage in ongoing professional development and contribute to service quality improvement.

2. Centre Based Care Early Intervention

- Work collaboratively as part of the ECEC teams to contribute to the observation, informal
 assessment and documentation of children's learning and development; develop and facilitate
 experiences and collaborate with educators to develop strategies to support children's learning and
 development and facilitate inclusion in the program.
- Work from a children's rights and strengths-based perspective.
- Administer developmental screening tools as per The Infants' Home's RTI model procedures and framework.
- Coach and capacity build team members in the ECEC programs to enable continued best practice in Early Intervention.
- Develop, facilitate, and evaluate Practice and Pedagogy sessions for integrated team members.
- Attend parent, community and staff meetings/events as required to support the services and organisation.
- Contribute to the promotion of effective teamwork practices and the integration of service provision across all program areas.

Essential Criteria

- Tertiary qualification in Speech Pathology (recognised by SPA).
- Eligibility for membership with Speech Pathology Australia membership is required throughout period of employment.
- Minimum two years' experience providing Speech Pathology to children aged 0 to 9 years.
- Demonstrated knowledge and experience in family-centred practice, early intervention, keyworker approaches, and child development.
- Sound knowledge in the provision of Speech Pathology with children and families, including understanding of keyworker approaches
- Knowledge of child protection legislation and related issues.
- Commitment to evidence-based practice and ongoing professional development.
- Strong written and verbal communication skills, with the ability to work both independently and as part of a team.
- Commitment to children's rights, diversity, inclusion, and workplace health and safety.
- Current NSW Drivers Licence (Class C), and use of own insured vehicle.
- A valid NDIS Worker Check.
- Knowledge of trauma-responsive practice (desirable).
- Knowledge of community services and government programs supporting families with young children (desirable).
- Experience working in early childhood settings and providing early intervention services within an interdisciplinary or transdisciplinary model (desirable).
- Experience working in a consultative framework (desirable).
- Experience supporting children and families at risk (desirable).
- Experience working with children on the autism spectrum, with knowledge of neurodiversity-affirming approaches (desirable)
- Experience supporting children and families who receive NDIS funding (desirable).
- Knowledge of RTI frameworks that link health and education practices (desirable).
- Knowledge of the EYLF (desirable).
